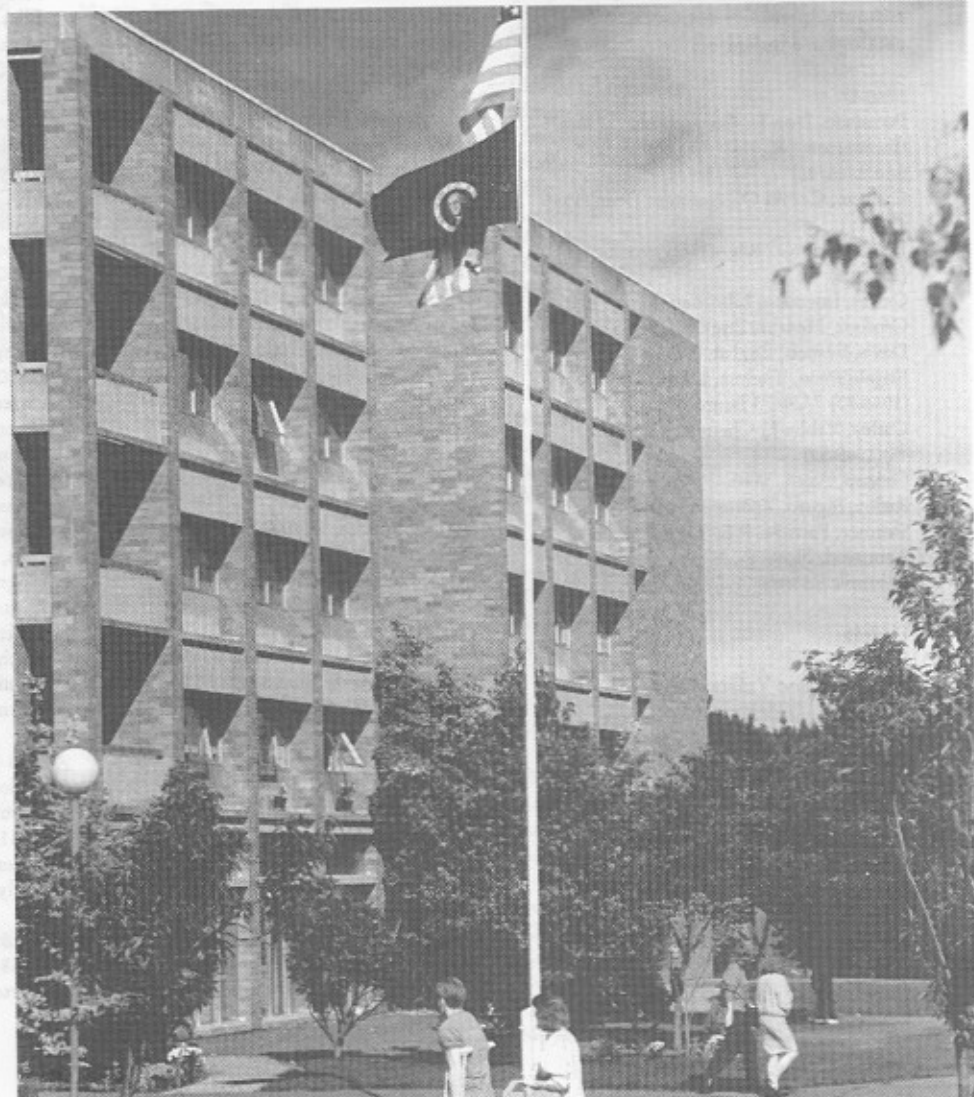

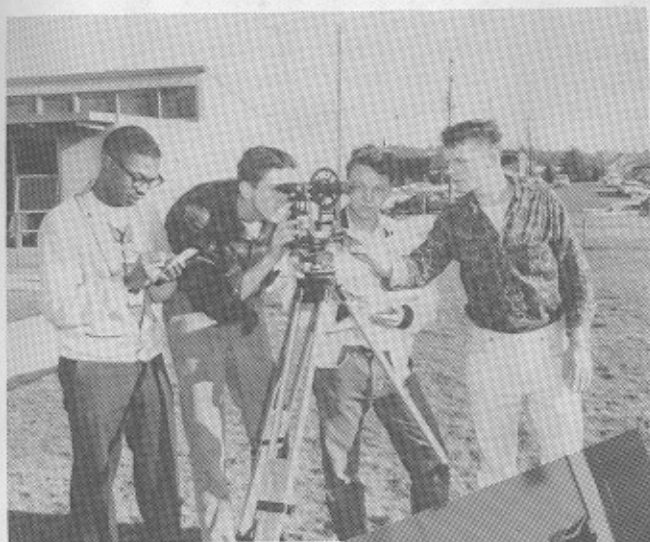

IV Chronology

1946

The first day of instruction begins on September 5 with 575 students enrolled at Olympic Junior College (OJC) of which 423 are men and 152 are women. Of these, 55.6% are veterans (226 men and 5 women).

In a letter, Pearl Wannamaker, State Superintendent of Schools, congratulates the Superintendent, the Board, and the staff on the opening of the Junior college and the excellent type of program set up. (9/19/46)

The first clubs and student organizations are the student governance structure of Association of Olympic (Junior) College Students (ASOC), the clubs are Co-Ed, Debate, Drama, Flash, Mens, Musical, Pep, Radio, and the student newspaper (The Spartan). The first athletic teams play basketball, baseball, track, golf, and tennis. The first inter-collegiate sports are basketball, track, and baseball.

Dr. William Black, State Board of Education, (in giving OC its formal blessing) told students of the new college today that credits attained at the local college would be transferable to other schools of the state and that the Bremerton school fills a demand of long standing. Lulu Haddon, Bremerton Commissioner of Finance (and former state senator) addressed the packed assembly. She sponsored the Junior College Bill in the senate some years earlier. (8/29/46)

The College maintains a list of available housing for students where they can find room and board. Any student not residing at a home must live in a place approved by the Dean of the Olympic Junior College. (9/46)

The first science classes hold lab sessions at Bremerton High School (afternoons and evenings). Olympic Junior College also uses the Bremerton High School gymnasium. The first library is located in the former military administration building on the corner of 16th and Chester Avenue. 1946 - The first summer session classes begin on June 16.

1947

Armin Jahr appointed dean.

The first student newspaper, The Spartan, is established with Brian Corcoran (editor), Al Fairchild (Business Manager), Joyce Ferguson (Womens News), Vivian Harris (Exchange Editor), Pat Kuhns (Association Editor), and Cub Wall and Bob Torseth sharing the Sports Editor position. Reporters are Dick Casad, Al Stewart, Don Schreiber, Dave Young, Roy Barrett, and Joyce Leyden. The advisors are Ken Fick, Dot Fick, and Mrs. Cleg.

The first cheerleaders are Patti Anderson, Emma Zoret, Marjorie Spooner, Ed Earing, Jack McDonald, and Larry Lindberg. (Ed Earing, Jack MacDonald, and Harry Linbergh. (1947 Annual)

The "Notre Dames" and "Michigan Monsters" are organized as women football teams. 1947 - Dean Jahr invites Board members and families to a get-acquainted banquet at the College. (11/10/47)

The Olympic Wives League begins with the club motto: To have a good time at the least possible expense. The Pinochle Club is organized.

"Rocket to the Moon" is the first play performed by Olympic Junior College students. (1947-48 Announcements)

1965

"Olympic Sounds" begins on KBRO Radio and conducts "more than 450 interviews with guests appearing on the program. It is impressive that polls conducted among the student body revealed that without exception, it could be readily identified." (Roy Franko Report)

1966

"The Olympiettes," a newly-organized Olympic College Drill Team (physical education/activity class) perform the first time during the football game half-time (10-8) in red/white uniforms. 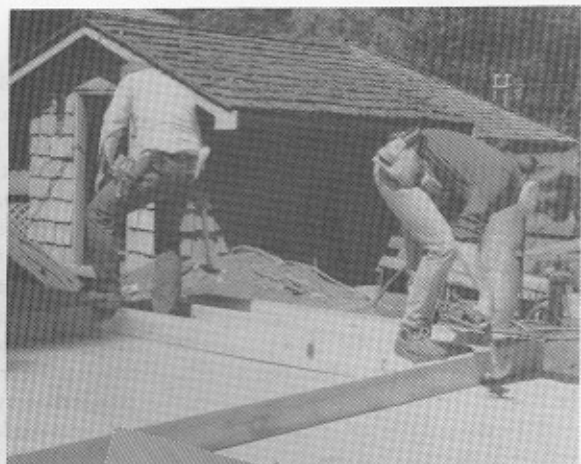

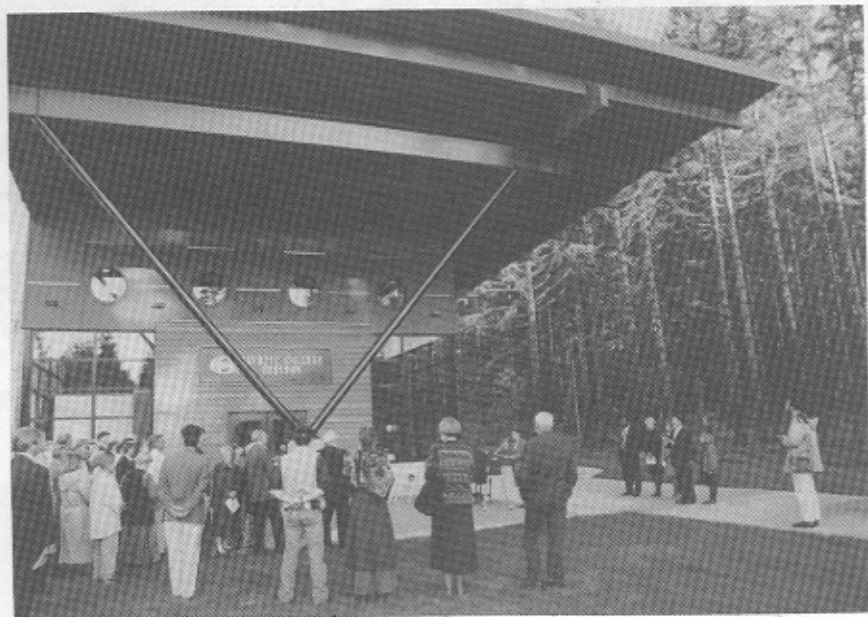

V Blueprint Espirit

For many years, since the fall of 1958, part of Darrell Estep's life has been linked to Olympic College; first as a student, then as faculty member and administrator. Because of Estep's interest in photography and work with the South Kitsap High School annual, his OC advisor encouraged his participation in similar pursuits in his college freshman year. The fact that his advisor, Jack Crouse, was also the OC faculty advisor to the annual and newspaper may have prompted the suggestion.

That was when students spent two days in grueling tests before fall quarter class assignments were made. I did remain on staff both years doing primarily publication layout and design, and served as editor of *The Campus* (the annual) during the second year. Crouse was an excellent advisor; sometimes flippant, but the younger set enjoyed his charisma.

Other instructors he remembers are Romaine Nicholson, speech; and Lynwood Smith, freshwater biology. It seemed to make sense (to come to OC). Others I knew had done so and found credible programs here. Olympic was small enough to let more students be involved in activities. I was a member of the Intercollegiate Knights, a national honorary service fraternity, and the Troopers, a group dedicated to off-campus service activities, and Scoutings Order of the Arrow.

Estep decided to work a year after he graduated from OC and applied to the Boeing Company willing to do anything. He was admitted into the drafting training program and worked in the Missile and Space Division drafting and preparing documents for new business contacts. When Boeing sought to train their workforce, they did so at community colleges. Estep was selected to become a trainer and joined the OC faculty on loan from Boeing. Even after the program was severely reduced, Estep remained as one of the few who was teaching the eight- and eleven-week classes.

In 1970, I was called back in house to Boeing only to become one of the 70,000 employees who were laid off. By this time, I had a wife and four children. We packed up and headed for college at Ellensburg. We both worked so I could earn two degrees. Rachel, our youngest, was born there. Just the same, when I graduated it felt like I was starting all over again.

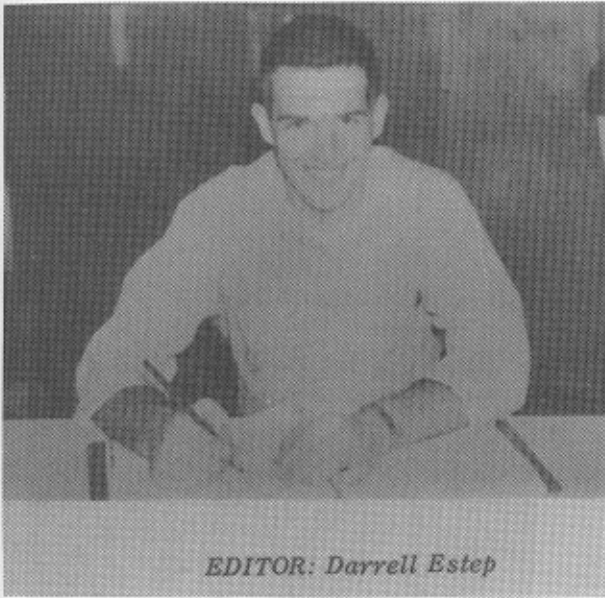
Olympic College had a contract to pull together a comprehensive education program in the adult prison at the Washington Correctional Center at Shelton. Estep was hired as the vocational supervisor and within six months promoted to director. I may be the only one who has gone to prison for Olympic College, he quips. We ran the library, GED, adult basic skills, vocational and college transfer classes for the inmates. At one time we had a staff of 22 faculty, and I regularly advised 2000 students per year.

After doing time for three years, he served as head of OCs division of Business and Engineering Related Occupations, where he took pride in helping to build an array of vocational programs. Estep's fascination with new technologies led to his involvement in computer assisted design instruction today and his advance certification to teach three-dimensional engineering drafting. Mementos of his years at OC hang in his office today which bear his name and those of former OC students, colleagues and long-time friends.

Millie is no bigger than a minute, but her energy level is miles high. This was never more evident than when she was a secretary at Olympic College and one of the first classified staff from 1966 (when OC became part of the Washington State community college system) until 1976.

"Whatever was needed; that's what I did." Typical tasks: placed job ads, processed leave slips, and conducted tests for potential personnel; typed brochures and mimeographed the class schedule; took meeting minutes when necessary, and helped organize the staff handbooks and the annual salmon bake.

How did she manage? She knows and comments quite matter-of-factly:

"Well, you must remember. This was BEFORE computers."

Before moving from the Bremerton School District with Roy Franko, administrative assistant to the president, to Olympic College, Millie had worked as a secretary for ten years at View Ridge Elementary.

"Those were busy days. When we conducted the presidential search in 1970, there were over 300 applicants to track. The dormitory was being built and Steve Kager came from Bellingham to manage it. The streets were being closed (and bypassed) to acquire a more contiguous campus; and OC had classes overseas at military bases and on ships.

"Helen Holt (secretary to the president) was one of my best friends. I also remember working with Mrs. Snow (she was never simply Ethel); always Mrs. Snow from purchasing. My what a frugal shopper! She would personally check each tire bought for the motor pool. There was Denise Blas, Joe Irons, Don Goodman, and of course, the students. So many wonderful students. Some stayed to eventually work at OC like Jeanne Balter, Pam Borne, and of course, Betty VanBoeyen. We were a real team. The college was bonded... one big family...and we had lots of fun, too. It was overwhelming at times, but I liked to stay busy."

Now widowed from Ed who was the boy next door when they were children in Renton, she is still busy as a Kitsap library volunteer, with her church, hobbies, and her many friends. One son is a missionary in Chile, the other a businessman in Chehalis. She has seven grandchildren. A caring and vivacious lady, Millie's humility tempers any self-praise when she speaks of Olympic College (and quite possibly, life).

"I just grew with the job!"

Choices. Deliberate educational choices. Kathy (Wallis) Varnum made informed choices even as a student in the fifties at Olympic College. Varnum was interested in personnel work, but there wasn't a program that matched her interests exactly in 1956. Perhaps there wasn't one at any college or university at that time for this honor student. "Yet, I am glad I locked in those first two years and earned my associate degree because now, finally, I am doing what I suspect I started out to do from the beginning."

It wouldn't be until after her marriage to Ernest and four children later that Kathy would return to Olympic College (to take several education classes) and then complete her bachelor's degree from Central Washington University in Special Education. Later she earned a masters degree (in two areas), and now works as a Learning Specialist/Elementary Counselor at Brownsville Elementary for the Central Kitsap School District.

"When I came to OC in '56 few of my close friends were here. Most had married or went to college elsewhere. A couple I remember are Nancy Gerhing, Sandy Vaa, Lillian Cernetig, and Tom Pelandini from Bremerton High. (Pelandini was on the Board of Controls, an oversight student body committee at that time.) We had great activities and I recall the excitement about the new science building opening. I met many wonderful people and attending OC allowed me to live at home and work part time," she recalls. "I worked for Mr. Webb in the administration building (at 65 cents an hour). It was one big room then-- everyone was together. Well, the president had an office, but the lines of authority weren't too obvious."

During her sophomore year Varnum was elected student body secretary. "As a group, we attended student leadership conferences and these were really valuable... and fun! We learned about student government and effective leadership. I also learned about dealing with the press. It seems there was a suspected problem with ballot box stuffing during one of the student elections. I was interviewed by a reporter over the telephone. What ended up in print didn't even come close to my responses. I was so upset."

It is peculiar what memories come to mind after forty years. "For some reason I remember the smell-- in the classrooms-- wet mostly (everyone wore wool in the winter), and the cold, damp buildings. Not many students had cars of their own, so we either walked or took the bus. Chuck Duffy was another student who also worked at OC while attending classes," she recalls with amusement. "He had a job in the biology lab and ate his lunch using the cadaver boxes for a table. We couldn't afford whole bodies, so I think it was the leg box!"

Today, Varnum's work is multi-faceted. She coordinates a special mentor program for students, surveys new teaching techniques for staff, and other projects, as well as problem-solving with parents and staff on academic and behavior issues. "I am involved in learning still. I love school, and the opportunities I've had to learn through my work. Sometimes I wish... I think... that I should take my doctorate just for the luxury of it all."

All four of the Varnum children have college degrees and she takes pride in their many accomplishments. "I also enjoy the privilege of having former students as teaching interns. This is the best reward for an educator-- to have a student recognize our mission and follow in our footsteps. It is the highest compliment."

Acknowledging that today's world is full of changes and today's student needs to think comprehensively, Varnum speaks with authority on the topic of choices. "Even though there are more choices now, if I could pass along any advice, it would be to lock in that associate degree. It gives a jumping off place for whatever choices are made later... whether to continue on in college or not. It doesn't matter what we want to be... we must be prepared to adjust."

Music and Memories

If it seems Robert Dietz stirs controversy as freely as he plays a concert grand, its true. What others might call scandalous, Dietz may consider the human condition of discontent. For many issues he prefers the arena of public debate. He says its healthy for individuals and for institutions.

"I was shocked when I came to Olympic College! First, by the condition of the buildings in '59; second by the lack of self-esteem on the part of the institution. Of course, what did I know. I was only 13."

Can we believe that?

"When the school board recommended construction of the science and humanities buildings on campus, they did so fully expecting Olympic College to fail. Those are classrooms designed for grade schoolers. The faculty offices were incredibly small. Later, the architects told me they had to fight to build any offices at all!

"There was plenty of silliness and pettiness to go around, but I was in for another shock. I remember Dean Kintzer called all new faculty to meet with him. Among his rules were: coats and ties were always required, no one was to leave campus before three o'clock in the afternoon; and no faculty were to write letters to the editor.

"Guess those were my pre-revolutionary days, but I stood up. I asked him if he meant what he said, because if he did I wanted him to know that I had First Amendment rights and I'd write a letter to anyone I damn well pleased. Thank you. One thing led to another and I tested other areas such as wearing political buttons in the classroom. Kintzer was only at OC a year as I recall."

The state-wide measure that would make all community colleges Washington State public institutions of higher education was heating up in the early Sixties, assisted by the efforts of Albert Rosellini, the former governor. Dietz recalls that Rosellini interceded on behalf of the faculty to secure state records years before the public approved Initiative 276 (that includes Washington States Open Record Act).

Dietz said one of the most dramatic conflicts on campus was over the use of student fees. "Carolyn Hershberger and I were appointed advisors to student government. We found access to money supported by students fees was one of the biggest sources of debauchery we'd ever seen.

"Things were being bought, everything and anything, without discretion. This was the same time that many student activists were trying to start a child care center. When the finances were scrutinized, it became evident that not all programs could be funded at previous levels, especially athletics. We recommended an increase in funding for some sports and intramurals, but a reduction in the number of sports OC sponsored. Well, everyone got in on the act, including the Bremerton Sun. There was a piece in the paper accusing me of being anti-sports.

"In time the day care was established and approved by the board, but it wasn't until our daughter (Gretchen Dietz) became something of a local sports celebrity that I had enjoyed some vindication."

Dietz had taught music six years at the University of North Dakota and also the University of Iowa while he completed his doctorate degree in musicology. After he came to OC, he took a years leave of absence in 1969-70 to teach at the University of Washington.

"I taught only one class four days a week as an associate professor, but I had 300 students! There were three TAs (teaching assistants) who conducted seminars on Fridays. Each day I would come on stage (and it was a stage, too), do my schitck then leave. After awhile I began to wonder if I had played this house before. The atmosphere was aloof, almost antiseptic, and students covered easily.

"I couldn't wait to get back to Olympic College. There is something about teaching at a community college that I love. The students, especially the evening students, don't take any crap.

"I was pleased to see the plans to honor Ralph Mutchler during Olympic Colleges fiftieth year. At his memorial I told how Ron Gillespie, then in charge of music for Bremerton Schools, had asked me to look at an unusual application one day. There was (the late) Ralph Mutchler. I knew him as a student of mine while in his senior year at North Dakota.

"He was brilliant and a first-class arranger. He earned his first degree in agronomy, but music was his love. OC was fortunate to have him in its history of wonderful music and drama instruction. Ted Turner and Raleigh McVicker joined the faculty after we be-

came part of K-14. Windel Jones went on to teach at Eastern Washington, and of course, Ralph Manzo as well. And, Harvey (Bill) and I did a lot of shows."

Whether ploy or weariness, Dietz passion for public debate may be quieter these days, but his concern for public education still roars. Evidence-- his (surprise?) election to the Central Kitsap School Board on the heels of his retirement from OC. He says his years of experience (since age 13?) help him identify who is playing games with education... and for what reasons. In its 50th year, he thinks OC, with all the gusto great self-esteem makes possible, should take itself seriously and insist on high standards.

"There are similar issues facing higher education across the country. Nationally, the words community college are on the lips of politicians. One thing is still obvious: the four-year schools haven't the slightest idea of what a community college is all about. I think well see more inquiries into the tenure system... my argument has always been that tenure should promote the free exchange of ideas, not incompetence. I think there will be more funding issues-- perhaps a push toward K-20 mergers."

Is this the same man who told the Board of Trustees that OC goes through administrators faster than grease through a goose?

Well, my reputation has been blown out of proportion--more than once."

Dr. Robert Dietz retired in 1995 after 34 years at Olympic College. He has received numerous awards for his academic achievements, leadership, and community efforts

The Mountain Muse

Jeanne Balter's relationship with Olympic College has been wild and unusual, as well as tranquil and enjoyable. It is one as a student and employee. Yet, for more than forty years her enthusiasm for new learning experiences has always taken precedence over any quick route to collect a degree (or a paycheck) and then never look back.

"When I think of all the things I've done (and there have been many) and of what OC has done for me; I keep coming back to the mountaineering and Camp Craft," Balter recalls with eyes that brighten with the scattering memories.

"My parents took us kids camping into the Olympics. Our friends were outdoor enthusiasts, too. We certainly don't have a 'gender gap' when the subject of backpacking arises. As a young couple, Jeanne and Ted went fishing on their dates. Later, they camped, hiked, climbed mountains, and enjoyed boating, skiing, and other outdoor activities with their three daughters.

"Ted and I established a legacy of love for hiking that now extends to our grandchildren. It's so fun to talk with them about their experiences on the trails. "I remember when Bruce (Craswell) mentioned the Camp Craft Program to Ted. We were both interested, but I was the one who ended up taking the 15-day backpacking trip through the Olympic Mountains the first time."

Olympic College's Camp Craft was a unique outdoor classroom that students took for credit or audit. It was featured in *Sunset Magazine* in 1954, and recommended by educators across the country. By the time the program ended over 30 years later, people from all over the world had come to Olympic College for this unique learning adventure.

"It was quite a program. Everyone had to pack their own gear, but food and climbing gear was brought in by horse back. Cooking grills and griddles were at the camp sites, sealed in paraffin and stored in cans in 'secret' places. Usually, the trip began at Sol Duc, then to the High Divide, Hoh Lake, the Olympus Shelter, Elk Lake, and on to Glacier Meadows (our base camp). From here, we took the snow route to climb Mount Olympus, then returned via the Hoh Ranger Station. I was a staff on two other summer trips: Nature Photography and the Wilderness Art Seminar."

Balter had extensive volunteer experience in Camp Fire Girls and other organizations so in addition to general camp duties and trail monitoring, she also led evening campfire songfests and storytelling. She and Ted were Camp Craft staffers for six years.

"OC instructors and escorts included George Martin, Dave Sicks (one of the first organizers and directors), Hank Blass, George Mandak, Dr. Hugh Klett, and many others. Recently retired Dr. Tom Walker (geology) was introduced to the Olympics his first year of teaching at OC via Camp Craft in 1969 or 70.

"Guest instructors would meet us at various locations on the trail. The Camp Craft approach was inter-disciplinary: botany, biology, photography, art, and of course, mushrooms. The average class was usually about 25 to 30 and students of various ages, from about 10 (with parents) to 74-year-young Jim Swanson, our soft-spoken unofficial guide

traordinaire for many years. Florence Sicks also helped me a lot. She told me how to get ready for that first trip!

"I still laugh when I think about this one gentleman, he was from Oregon. He was rather reserved and quiet, but at the beginning of the trip he would join the 'work crew' as we met to discuss the next day's plans after the evening campfire. He always did this little ritual with a stick in the fire... each evening this was repeated. It was a bit curious, but we thought it might have some particular meaning to him. Finally Dr. Klett asked him, 'What is this ritual you seem to do?' And, he stated simply, 'I'm burning my shorts.' Seems he saved his old shorts to take on hiking trips. He preferred to burn them rather than pack home dirty laundry!

"I can tell you this... I was a 'scary cat' in my first mountaineering class. I was so afraid on Lightning Peak (at the end of Lake Cushman); and so sure I'd fall that I didn't want to go up or down. I wanted a helicopter to get me off! But, you know. I did it... and gained confidence from that accomplishment."

While working at Olympic College (Business Services), her friend Charlotte Kraus of Admissions and Records called Balter one day and told her she was the only student with a three-page transcript. Then she teased her saying, "you've got 500 PE credits, so when are you going to finish your degree and make an honest woman of yourself?"

"George (Martin) used to always say... 'Everyone has their own pace. Everyone is different.' I was usually at the end of the hiking group because I liked it there. And, there were always others who took their time. That was their pace- - that was my pace-- no pressure."

Jeanne Balter went on to conquer many other peaks, among them Mount St. Helens. In 1988, she completed her Associate in Arts and Sciences Degree.

"It was the first year that OC returned to the traditional commencement service. I felt a tremendous sense of accomplishment. Some might say, 'it's only a two year degree,' but it took me 35 years!"

Balter says she never took to the mountains to "find herself" but mountaineering taught her a great deal about life, trust, teamwork, and what's important.

"There will always be people who are slower, who set a different pace, who appreciate the chance to focus carefully on the trail ahead. Olympic College has helped us do that in life, too. And, we mark our successes one step at a time."



The Spirit of Scholarship **George Martin**

(1901-1970)

George Martin's first teaching assignment was at Bremerton High School in 1930. He taught science, photography, and physical education. After three years, he was appointed vice-principal. In 1949, he transferred to Olympic College and assumed the duties of Registrar. He remained in that position until his retirement in 1966.

Martin is remembered for originating programs such as the Evening Adult Education, Mountaineering, and Search and Rescue. His accomplishments and reputation were recognized nationally. He published several books on camping and outdoor activities and authored articles in national magazines.

Martin was a pioneer in the field of outdoor safety and conservation. A Seattle Post-Intelligencer article, "High Altitude Study Offers Olympic Climbers College Credit," (8/4/63) indicates there was opposition to the outdoor program at Olympic College. Consequently, the program was incorporated into the Physical Education and Health Program to remain intact. Olympic College's outdoor education program influenced similar programs in colleges across the country.

Originally from Kansas, Martin's family moved to Mansfield (Douglas County), Washington when he was three years old. He graduated from Spokane High School and received his bachelor's degree in education at the University of Washington in 1929. He completed his master's degree in zoology at the University of Washington in 1948.

After his retirement, Martin donated his books and memorabilia to Olympic College. They are housed in a separate area of the Learning Resource Center as the *George Martin Collection*.

"No one has ever trudged after George up a steep mountain trail or shared a campfire with him who does not come away richly rewarded in appreciation for his boundless energy and his unselfish and sympathetic interest in the welfare of each member of the party."

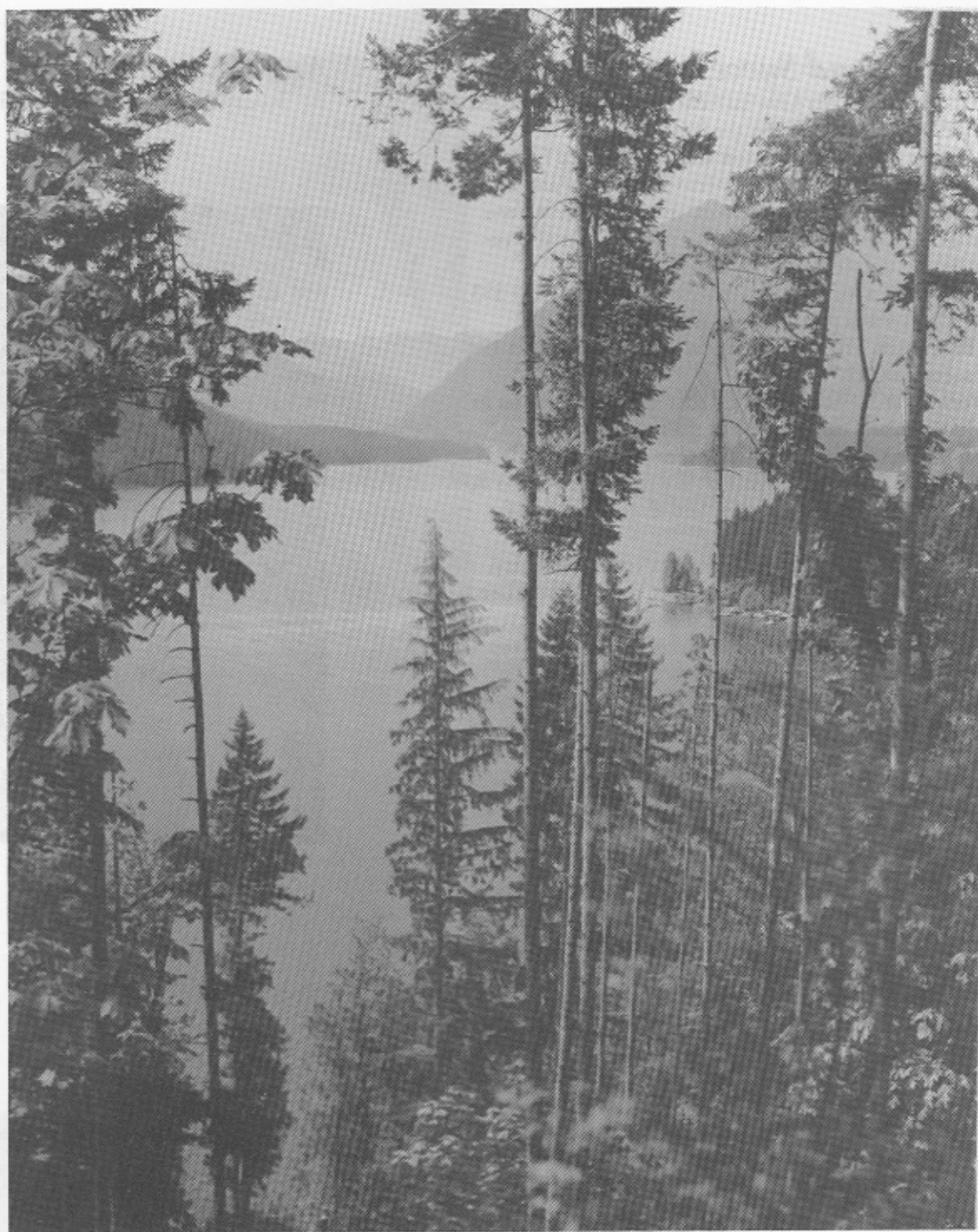

Commitment and Success

Sports and good friends have influenced a big chunk of Art McCarty's life. He won a place on the freshman team his first year at the University of Washington and a job at Hec Edmondson Pavilion. Born and raised in Bremerton, McCarty and his friends Bob Romley, Duane Thompson, and others have been crossing paths for more than fifty years-- in ways that also reflect the paths and unfolding of Olympic College.

"That job meant a lot even though the tuition was only \$33 a quarter. Initially, I was a pre-major in psychology. We had played for Bremerton High, won the state championship in 1941, and placed second in '42."

Yet, World War II was raging and that meant disruption in the lives, education and career plans of many.

"We were facing the draft. Les Eathorne and I had made a deal to go into the paratroops together. We were gung-ho to do our part. Les went into the paratroops and after a battery of tests, I went into the Army Air Corps."

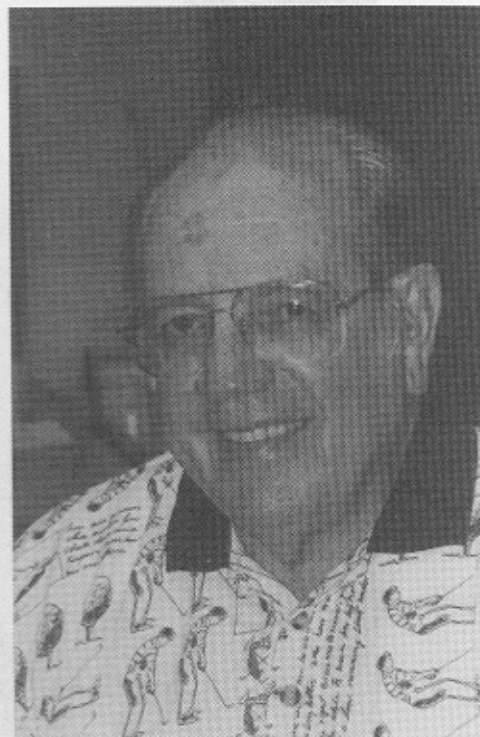
McCarty left the pre-flight program due to an eye injury. The result? More tests; more schooling; first to Stanford, then Oregon State, and the University of California at Davis. "Actually, I was involved in some exciting projects then. The Army Signal Corps was working on early versions of fax machines, scanners, and improved radar. My only tour of overseas duty was in the Caribbean. Consequently, unlike my buddies who served in the Pacific and Europe, I had to make a special application to the Veterans of Foreign Wars later, just to get into the organization." In 1946, McCarty returned to the UW and completed his BA and received his "fifth year" certificate. He then married Teddy Green, also a Bremerton High grad and UW student. "When I signed my first teaching contract in Camas (Washington), I considered myself well-schooled, but poorly educated."

After four years at Camas, spending summers in grad school at the University of Oregon at Portland, McCarty returned to Bremerton to work in the insurance and annuity business. Later, he returned to teaching, first at George Dewey Junior High, and then at East High School. Following a sabbatical as intern to the president of Shoreline Community College, he received his MA from the UW, then accepted the Assistant Director of Student Activities at Olympic College. "I am so very proud of many former students. I value the relationships I've had with kids, especially as a coach. It's an added responsibility, very visible, very demanding. Students know a coach is probably checking up on their attendance and grades. I was interested in their total development-- both intellectual and physical. Too often, academia looks upon physical and health education as something less. I see athletes and athletics as something more."

A real community college fan, McCarty makes a distinction between the concept of a junior college (college freshman and sophomore years) and a community college which offers vocational education, non-credit classes, and is responsive to other

educational options. In his work at Olympic College, both as Dean of Students/Registrar and as a faculty member, time seems to have softened the blows and memories which brought so much change, both to Olympic College, and its students and staff. "Those were stressful times: demonstrations against the war in Vietnam; including sit-ins in the administration building and an underground railroad to Canada; the controversy about leadership in the Nursing Program; television cameras on campus during the faculty strike; and flamboyant student leadership. Every day became an adventure in zero-hour diplomacy."

At the same time McCarty recalls a real feeling of togetherness on campus. He remembers a College with mostly day-time students and no noon-time classes which he thinks encouraged clubs and visiting lecturers. As men's advisor and mentor, one of his responsibilities included inspecting student housing! McCarty became the Director of Athletics and campus representative to the state Community College Athletic Commission. Athletic events were successful and well-attended by all. Memorial Field was often at capacity and the gym was usually full before game time. "Many students were from out-of-town and had parents who were concerned about the quality of available housing. This is what led to the construction of the five-story student dorm which is now the College Service Center."

"There were lighter moments, too. The late Ruth Cigler was my secretary and office manager. She and her husband, Harold, were part of a group of faculty and staff in the Kitsap Teachers' Bowling League. One year, my wife and I decided to go to Reno with the Ciglers on a short vacation. Before long, a rumor flew through the building and it created quite a stir. People thought only Ruth and I were going to Reno together. She was very concerned, but I told her 'don't do anything to disturb the gossip.' It was fun to see just how silly it became before people realized that we took our spouses with us."

When asked about the "glue" that has bonded the friendships and fond memories, McCarty surmises, "Well, we've all been active, social, and civic minded. My friends have been successful in their own fields. But, (humor here), we've never lived in the same cities, but we've been near enough to see each other often."

Art McCarty still sees Olympic College on a regular basis and for good reason. "It is now my privilege to serve on the Olympic College Foundation Board and two members are my former students- Gene Kennedy and Bill Maiers. I am proud of that!"



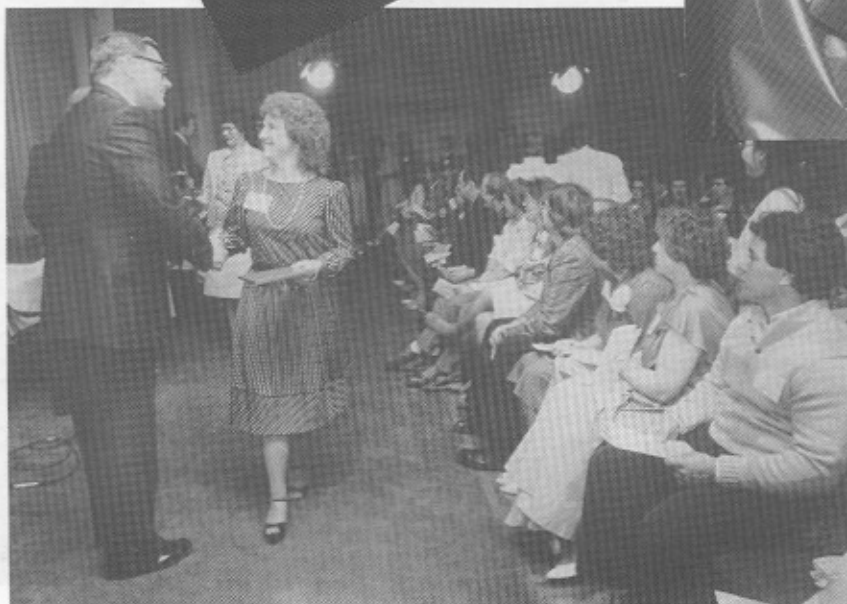
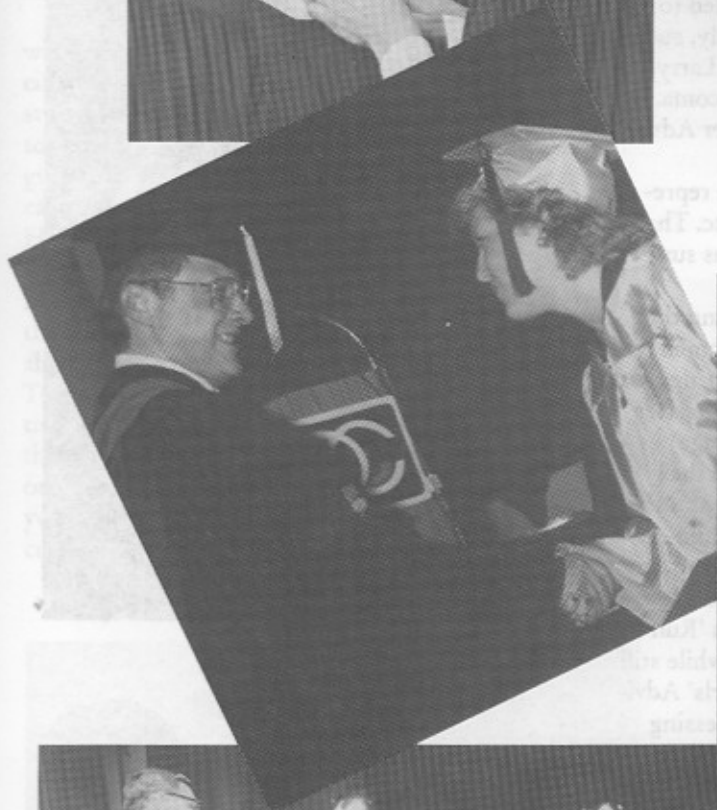
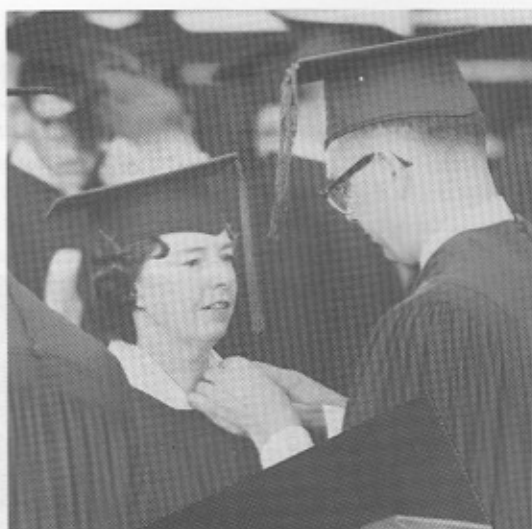

"Look here! I didn't know I was here at the same time as Sandy. She's getting her doctorate from Portland State now!"

Carolyn (Kahn) Hershberger thumbs through the Olympic College 1964 annual (The Olympian) and finds herself face-to-face with former students and faculty, but finding Sandra (Harkins) Byrnes, a computer scientist at Keyport, was a surprise.

"She's my tennis partner. In fact, we're scheduled to play this afternoon! Others stand out immediately, such as her best friend, Archelle Bouchard who married Larry Reynolds (a former OC instructor) and lives in Tacoma. And, Dan McDonald, a member of OC's Computer Advisory Committee.

"I notice here, that all the area high schools are represented," she notices, "East, West, Central, South, etc. That's neat. Obviously, OC was accomplishing what it was suppose to do."

Invariably, male graduates sport the trim hair and the button-down casual "elegance" of the 60's. Most women repeat the smooth, puffed Jackie Kennedy coifs and bangs and knee-length, one-piece, smooth-fabric fashions. Page after slick page, Hershberger (with a 30-year seer advantage) stops to chat about Danny Ward, Denny Gore, and their music; Kay Morgan (now a practicing psychologist and the 1996 OC Commencement speaker), of Charlene Shildmeyer and her "fabulous visual art," and others: Judy Swanson, Bill Carter and Nancy Sue Templeton, to name a few.

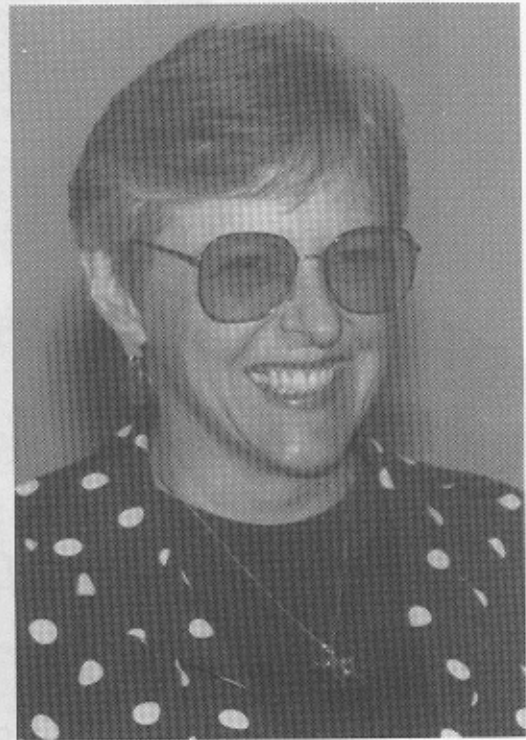
"First, you should know I was something like a 'Running Start' student in those days". I attended OC while still going to East High School. Lillian Green (EHS Girls' Advisor) recommended I check into the new Data Processing Program. She was so neat. She even loaned me her car so I could come over and talk with Rita Gordon.

"I attended East half day, then OC half day. But, I remember when I was at OC, I didn't feel like a high school student. I was a college student. The DP Program was very comprehensive. For instance, I took DP/Communications, but this was taught by the English faculty, Romaine Nicholson to be exact. Likewise for DP/Mathematics and so on. They didn't separate out the disciplines. These classes were taught at OC, but the DP classes were at what is now the Bremerton School District building (on 6th and Montgomery). Rita Gordon (page 23) was the instructor, and we used pre-computer equipment-- punch cards and programmed by wiring boards."

Hershberger's social life was important in high school.

"In spite of everything, I did have a solid "B" average. And, my folks could have sent me to college elsewhere, but I had found my niche in data processing. I lived at home-- paid tuition and books from the money I earned working at OC for Joe Irons and Ruth Cigler."

What do you remember about OC of the 60's?

"I was in the Olympic College cafeteria when JFK was shot. Word spread like wild fire. Everyone was in shock! The college was more involved in student's lives-- to say the least! There were clubs like the Bachelor's Club, mostly 'jocks'-- the popular men on campus.

"Those were the years of panty raids of women who lived off campus. So one night (we) women decided to retaliate. We went on a jockey short raid and strung them on a line that stretched from the Rotunda to the Bookstore; but that was AFTER we wrote the guy's names on the shorts! Well, soon after we were called in to President Park's office. He questioned us. He was right, but we didn't 'fez up!

"During spring break I attended a big party over on Highland Avenue with students from OC, Western, the UW and other colleges. The party was raided and about 20 or 30 of us were hauled to the police station. To illustrate how naive we were, when we were questioned about who was from Western or the UW, etc., those so indicated were permitted to leave. This left only OC students. And, we were lectured: 'what are your folks going to say?' and so forth. Then, finally we could leave.



"Well, when the next quarter started, we were called into the Presidents office and told we were 'misbehaving.' No need to wonder how he knew. Well, with my smart mouth then (and still have now), I told him it was 'spring break' and none of his business.

"You simply had to live the era-- there was a close connection at OC for a two-year college. That has its advantages and disadvantages. The down-side of the era was the lop-sided approach to (the prevention of and penalties for) sexual assaults. No doubt. And, I think there was a real bias by some high school counselors from a gender perspective. The less-than-academic woman student was not encouraged to attend college. To me, for many would-be students, Olympic College was (maybe still is) a missed opportunity."

Do you have a wish for Olympic College's next fifty years?

"I wish I could dedicate, in honor of my parents, a technology center at OC that would knock your socks off!"

Hershberger earned two associate degrees at Olympic College. After working in Seattle several years, she returned to teach Data Processing. She finished her bachelor's degree in Computer Information Systems Management at The Evergreen State College and is currently working on her MBA in Leadership. She is now the Instructional Computing Coordinator.

Arms behind head, she leans back in the office chair, looks at the ceiling and smiles. With a hint of the youthful mischievousness many educators can recall, Hershberger whispers, "I received an incredible education at Olympic College."

*Running Start is a program that offers college classes to high school juniors and seniors who meet the criteria established by the Washington State Educational Choices Act.

Ab Youth!

It was 1970. It was bell-bottom pants, disco shirts, big hair, and a rapidly changing social life for young adults. The Olympic College dorm was open, co-ed, and distracting, but inter-collegiate football for community colleges was alive in Washington State.

"I guess I wanted to continue my education, but I was more interested in playing football," said Grover Johnson. A Newton, Mississippi High School graduate, Johnson was offered a scholarship to play football at OC.

"There was the dormitory. I didn't live there, but it brought lots of out-of-towners to OC. All I know is... Olympic College changed my life. I remember Coach Rosenbaugh and the fact that we had a good first year. Then, I was out of school for a year and returned. Football, the second year, wasn't so good."

Johnson worked in construction for twenty years. He was recently named "Foreman of the Year" for his management of concrete work in the Pike Street Market Parking Garage.

"I didn't finish my degree. I married and had a family to support. I'm short two or three quarters of the credits needed to graduate. I wish I had been more focused on my studies at the time. If I knew then what I know now, possibly I would have stayed in school. But, we can learn from our experiences, right? Still... OC was good for me."

Olympic College in the seventies recycled glass, scuba dived, raised money for needy Kitsap County kids, and featured Christian rock groups such as The New Hope Singers as well as Charas Ali Khan, famed Indian musician. Variety, diversity, and experimentation typified ASOC activities: a graphoanalysis expert, an ESP authority, and sex education week.

"I remember Herm Nelson. He was my track coach. Then there was Mr. Simpson (typing). Some of the other students I remember are Dave Weaver, Tony Campbell, Larry Jackson, Sam Lemon, and Jackie Smith. And, I must include Jim Hayes, who was and remains a very good friend all these years."

Today, Johnson teaches a variety of classes for the Northwest Labor Employment Trust Fund which is supported by employer contributions to union workers. "We are a subsidiary of Spokane Community College. We've operated out of Kingston since 1983. I teach many construction basics, from concrete to pre-construction training for apprentices. The program serves 14 local unions, and we recently merged with a similar program in Oregon as part of the growing West Coast region."

Johnson's sons followed their dad to the grid iron. Grover IV played for University of Idaho Vandals and Devon enters the University of Washington as a freshman this fall with a football scholarship. His wife of 25 years, Hella-Ilona, now teaches Business Administration at Olympic College.

"She finished both her B.A. and M.B.A. after our boys were in school, Johnson remarked. So, just maybe, I'll put those OC credits in order one of these days. That would be good for me, too."
